CUBE

- **C** = Circle the key numbers. If written in word for, write the standard form above the word.
- U = Underline the question. What are you being asked to solve.
- **B** = Box key words. These words will tell you what to do.
- **E** = Evaluate steps you should take and eliminate information you don't need.
- **S** = Solve and Check! Does my answer make sense?

RELAX

- R = Read the questions carefully and re-read to find the answers.
- **E** = Examine every answer choice before you choose your answer.
- L = Label your answer in the passage when you fine it.
- A = Always check your answers by looking back!

COUNSELOR'S CORNER READ, READ!

When it comes to picking up a book and having story time with your kid, there is no such thing as starting too early. Reading to preschoolers -- and keeping books at home -- encourages language development, reading skills, and future success in school. "Even if your child is still too young to understand everything you're saying, he will learn to notice the rhythms of language, which will help him build a listening vocabulary," explains Susan M. Heim, author of *It's Twins! Parent-to-Parent Advice from Infancy Through Adolescence*. In fact, reading to your child has been proven to help him emotionally: A government-funded study conducted by The Institute of Education in the United Kingdom found that 5-year-olds who were read to daily by their parents were less

likely to have behavioral problems in school.

How Poems for Kids Boost Reading Skills

- 1. **It rhymes (mostlyl)** Rhyming language can help struggling kids read more smoothly, says Mary Ann Scheuer, librarian at the Emerson School in Berkeley, CA. Rhymes also show kids that words are made up of syllables, which helps them recognize the same sound in different words. Plus, it can improve spelling it's not so far from "cat" to "mat," once you have the "at."
- 2. **It develops vocabulary** Poetry incorporates words kids don't usually encounter, yet the form's short, approachable nature makes it easy for them to figure out the meaning from the surrounding context. This can prepare them for tackling longer texts later on, Scheuer explains.
- 4. **It's easy and fun to memorize** Memorization helps kids internalize patterns of sophisticated language. When they recite, they learn how to enunciate as well as to pronounce unfamiliar words, leading not only to more flexibility with reading but better communication overall.
